Emadwaleni lies just south of the Matobo National Park, along the Kezi road. It has been established by Mark Ncube, a member of this Society, who has invited us to visit the site. In his words, "I decided that satisfying the desires of eco-tourists could be combined with efforts to preserve my own culture", so you can expect an interesting outing. There are fine views across the south western Matopos, and in particular of Mt Njelele (though this site will not be visited). Please drive carefully on the Kezi road, as road works are in progress from the 85Km peg.

## **4 – REPORT BACK**

We again enjoyed a successful social outing on 28 September, visiting the Matobo Communal Lands, not far from the Matobo Mission. The group of nearly forty members passed the attractive, and at that time still spilling, Sotcha dam, before embarking on a climb up Sotcha hill to the rarely visited Sotcha Cave. The climb was gradual, and leisurely, and every member made it without getting out of breath! (Well not too much out of breath!) At the cave, a talk was given on the features of the rock art, and examples of some of the damage being inflicted on our rock art were illustrated. The group then split up, with some continuing to the summit of the hill, possibly the highest point in Matabeleland at over 1560m (5160 ft) above sea level, and the rest continuing directly to visit two additional cave sites, one containing grain bins in good condition, though sadly, the mouth of the cave bore the scars of damaged trees, cut down no doubt for fire wood. Before leaving Sotcha, the Chairman presented 150 MCS Conservation booklets to Mrs Ndlovu of Dopi Primary School for distribution amongst the pupils.

The group continued south along the Sotcha Loop road and had lunch within a grove of magnificent *Brachystegia glaucescens* (Mountain acacia) trees, not far from Sibazwe hill. After lunch, the more well-known Gulubaghwe cave, on the Old Gwanda Road was visited where again rock art was discussed - and the inevitable damage examined. Members made their way home along the Old Gwanda Road, after a comprehensive day.

### 5 - RAIN!

Despite early rains, and some exceptional falls in the western hills in October, the Matopos is generally some 60 - 80% of average at this time. With the threat of El-Nino looming we can expect a hot dry summer - so please help prevent veld fires.
