1 - ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting of the Society will be held at 2:30pm on 13th November at Big Cave Camp (see details below). This is an important event for our members, as we find ourselves, as a country, in the most difficult of circumstances. We hope that members will show their support, contribute to the debate, and stand for positions on the committee.

2-SNAKES

We have come to the end of the articles on Dangerous Snakes of the Matopos. We hope that members have found this to be both interesting and useful.

However, as a conservation society it is important that we do not lose sight of the important role that snakes play in our environment. The old adage that the only good snake is a dead one is a statement not supported by us. Whilst the articles may have highlighted the dangers of some of our snakes, they did not go on to emphasise how rarely a snake is seen, and a sighting of a mamba or other of the great snakes is as rare, and special, as that of a leopard sighting.

3 - STANBIC BANK WAIVES BANK CHARGES

Stanbic Bank has agreed to waive all bank charges on the Society's Bank account. With rising bank costs, this is a considerable "donation" to the Society, for which we are most appreciative.

4 – RAINFALL

The early weather reports suggest that the Matopos will enjoy a normal rainy season in 2005 / 2006. We certainly hope so, as the hills are particularly dry.

5 – NATIONAL PARKS

We continue to receive conflicting reports from visitors to the Matobo National Park. On the positive side, there have been very favourable comments made in respect of staff serving at some of the dam sites, and a considerable effort was made to improve all the firebreaks. Regretfully fires did break out, and, sadly, large sections of the park were damaged as a result. Facilities are clean, and repair has been carried out within the Maleme Rest Camp. Exotic eucalyptus trees have been cut down in the Arboretum area, and new fencing has been erected along

On the negative side, a number of ablution blocks at camping and caravanning sites have been found to be without water, cattle intrusions into the park appear to be worse than ever, parts of the Park are heavily overgrazed, and fencing wire continues to be stolen.

The park itself is very dry, and visitors are urged to take particular attention to avoid starting fires.

There are plans to capture and sell up to 20 sable. Whilst the proceeds will be used to fund costs associated with the World Heritage Site, we are concerned about the impact of this proposal on the sable herds in the Matopos, which have not recovered since the last major relocation in the early 1990's. Sable antelope were previously seen with every visit to the park - today sightings are rare and the removal of a further 20 animals will only make this situation worse.

6 - TREE, ORCHID AND ALOE BROCHURE

The long awaited Matobo Hills checklist for trees, orchids and aloes has finally been completed, and will be on sale at the Main ate into the Matobo National Park. Brochures will also be available at the AGM, all at a cost of \$10,000 each. This brings to four the number of Matobo Hills brochures that have

been produced by the society. We acknowledge the considerable input of the contributors and proofreaders, and artist.

Of particular interest were the impressive Aloe excelsa to be found on the kopjes. Members were welcomed with a cup of tea by John and Jill Dudman, and then taken to the picnic site for a braai.

10 – BIRDLIFE WEEKEND

A handful of MCS members joined Birdlife Zimbabwe (Matabeleland Branch) on their now annual weekend at Maleme Rest Camp. Saturday 20th August proved to be most interesting with visits to two black eagle nests with chicks, and a view of the rare black eagle nest located in a tree at Arboretum. We also saw a Fish Eagle with a chick, a Crowned Eagle on the nest, an Ovambo Sparrow Hawk and numerous other birds of prey – all in the company of expert birders! The afternoon was concluded with a most informative update by Viv Wilson on the Matopos Leopard Research, and then an evening braai.

11-MCS EVENING

Prof Hyland presented a number of points for discussion during his presentation of "The Matobo Hills - Place, Tradition and Memory: tangible aspects of the intangible heritage of Zimbabwe: a case study of the Matopos" on 19th August 2005. We appreciate the use of the Lions Club of Matopos Den, and the assistance of WEZ, in arranging the evening, which was well attended. Regretfully Prof Hyland has left Zimbabwe, but he has promised to make available to the Society a copy of the paper. The debate that followed during question time was positive and interesting.

12 – RHODES SUMMER HOUSE

In early July a fire destroyed the Rhodes Summer House, near REPS School. It is understood from National Museums that this 110-year-old National Monument, all that remained of Rhodes House at his Matopos Estates, was burnt down as an act of arson, and is being investigated. Rhodes' Coffin rested
